*I am pleased to present to you the 2015 Annual Report. The report contains information pertaining to the activities of your police department from January through December 2015. In addition to our department being busy, there were few notable incidents.*

*In January, several Sam's Clubs had been a victim of credit card fraud, including the one in the Town of Brookfield. Officer Eade in her diligent work to identify suspects lead to the arrest and conviction of two suspects by the Town of Brookfield. The scam involved four different states, Wisconsin, Florida, Iowa and Illinois with a total loss of approximately \$51,400. Other officers from our department did an outstanding job, from apprehending the suspects, locating key evidence and assisting the Secret Service. Agent Ferris from the Secret Service indicated, "The collaborative team effort by our agencies stopped a significant crime spree occurring across Wisconsin and put a stop to further significant fraud losses and ID theft victims". Both suspects were convicted in Waukesha County Circuit Court. One of the suspect's received a five-year prison sentence and the other suspect received probation. Both suspects are pending federal judicial action through the Western District of Wisconsin.*

*Also in January, there was an Armed Robbery at the BP/Open Pantry. During the robbery, two suspects fired multiple rounds inside and outside of the business. A few days later, the same suspects were involved in another Armed Robbery in the City of Waukesha, in which the store clerk was killed. The suspects were charged and convicted in Waukesha County Circuit Court. Sentencing is scheduled in May 2016.*

*In October, Officer Meyer and Officer Eade responded to Sam's Club for a male who was unconscious and not breathing around 4:50 a.m. They quickly assessed the situation, administered the AED and continued CPR until the ambulance arrived. Emergency room Doctor Deluhery stated that victim is alive due to the application of the AED. The victim made a full recovery.*

*In November, Officer Funk responded to a Robbery and Battery incident at BP/Open Pantry. The victim described the suspect's vehicle but reported the wrong license plate. Officer Funk quickly tied this incident with a Child Abduction incident that occurred earlier in the City of Milwaukee. This made it possible to identify the suspect and successfully closed the case. The suspect has been charged and is currently pending court proceedings in Waukesha County Circuit Court.*

*On behalf of the members of the police department, I would like to thank the Town Board, the Town employees, and all the members of our community for their continued support throughout the past year. We are committed to providing the best possible services to the public and businesses we serve.*

# DEPARTMENT PROFILE

---

The Town of Brookfield is located in the United States, State of Wisconsin, Waukesha County. The Town shares borders with neighboring City of Brookfield, City of Waukesha, City of Pewaukee, City of New Berlin, Town of Waukesha, Village of Menomonee Falls, and Town of Lisbon.

With a balance of retail, commercial, industrial, and a residential population, the Town of Brookfield is a community of approximately 6,064 residents and a daytime population that swells to approximately 40,000 people.

The Town of Brookfield Police Department consists of 17 sworn police personnel, and is supported by a civilian administrative assistant and civilian volunteer Police Chaplain. The Police Department provides police services 24-hours a day, 365-days a year.

The Town of Brookfield Police Department is proud of being able to provide a high level of service and responsiveness to our residents, businesses, and visitors who travel through our community. The members of the department take pride in the fact that they are always open to the public's concerns and are willing to make the extra effort to create a comfortable and secure community. The Town of Brookfield prides itself in providing and keeping up with current technology and providing the equipment needed for its police officers to do their jobs.

# WAUKESHA COUNTY COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

---



The Town of Brookfield Police and Fire Department are dispatched by the consolidated dispatch center, Waukesha County Communications Center (WCC). WCC is a 9-1-1 Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) and provides dispatch server for 29 communities within Waukesha County.

Callers needing police, fire, or medical help are assisted by a call-taker at the center. The call takers obtain the information from the callers and forward the call to the appropriate dispatcher, (police or fire) who will then send the units to the scene. The call taker from WCC will generally stay on the line and can provide both reassurance as well as **life-saving instructions** to the caller before the emergency units arrive.

The communications center is staffed with 47 telecommunicators who are cross trained in call taking, police and fire dispatch functions. The center is staffed 24/7 with Communications Center Supervisors, who support and manage the team at the center. WCC has a Community Education Team who are available to help educate the public about 9-1-1, and tours of the center are always available and encouraged. # DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL NOTABLE ACTIONS

## OFFICER'S RECEIVE LETTER OF COMMENDATION

On October 01, 2015 Officer Bradley Meyer and Officer Michelle Eade responded to Sam's Club, located at 600 Springdale Rd for a sixty-four year old male who was unconscious and not breathing. Upon arrival, the officers observed an employee trying to provide CPR. Officer Meyer and Officer Eade quickly assessed the situation, administered an AED and a shock was delivered to the patient. They continued CPR and assisted the Town of Brookfield Fire Department who took over care for the patient and transported him to Elmbrook Memorial Hospital.

Dr. Matthew Deluhery, M.D. who is the Medical Director and attending emergency room physician that day indicated that the quick application of the AED by officers and CPR saved that man's life. Thanks to the quick intervention by Officer Meyer and Officer Eade, the victim survived. Officer Meyer and Officer Eade each received a Letter of Commendation from Chief Perket for their outstanding effort that day.

# 2015 TAX REFUND INTERCEPTION PROGRAM (TRIP)

---

## Legal Information

Sections 71.93, 71.935, 73.03 (52), 73.03 (52m), and 73.03 (52n), [Wis. Stats.](#), authorize the Wisconsin Department of Revenue (DOR) to intercept taxpayer refunds, other refundable credits, and lottery prizes to be applied against the amount the taxpayer owes to certain state agencies, local governments, the IRS, federally recognized tribes located in Wisconsin, and other states. State agencies and other governmental entities intending to participate in the refund interception program must enter into a written agreement with DOR. In addition, a state logon ID and password may be required to exchange data with DOR via the Internet.



The Town of Brookfield Police Department began entering unpaid traffic, municipal and parking tickets onto the TRIP System in 2009. When entering debts on the TRIP system the debtor's Social Security Number and Name will be matched against DOR records to identify the debtor. Not all debts are listed on the TRIP system, a complete match of Social Security Number and Name will result in an "accept" answer and if the Social Security Number and Name does not match the debt will receive a "reject" answer. Trip has accepted **2,356** total accounts with a grand total of **\$376,935.20** outstanding debt.

The busiest times for collecting these unpaid debts are January through April, which is the tax refund season. The Town of Brookfield received **\$29,049.38** in 2015 from Tax Intercept. This is money that would not have been collected without the assistance of this program. The TRIP Program has given us a way to collect fines and forfeitures that were previously uncollectable.

# SUCCESSFUL COLLECTIONS IN 2015



The governing body or the Municipal Court may contract with a collection agency for the collection of unpaid forfeitures, assessments, and surcharges under s. 66.0114(1)(a). The contract shall provide that the collection agency shall be paid from the proceeds recovered by the collection agency.

We signed an agreement with the Waukesha County Debt Collection Agency who will be committed to assisting the Town of Brookfield Police Department and Municipal Court collect outstanding forfeitures from the previous years.





## PARKING CITATIONS PER MONTH








In May the Town of Brookfield Police Department participated in a nationwide prescription drug take back day. The TBPd partnered with the WI Department of Justice (WI DOJ). Citizens were given the opportunity to bring their expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs to the police department for disposal. The drugs were later delivered to the DEA Headquarters in SE WI where they were shipped off for incineration.

This initiative addresses a vital public safety and public health issue. Medicines that languish in home cabinets are highly susceptible to diversion, misuse, and abuse. Having these Take Back Days allows citizens to safely dispose of these drugs.
