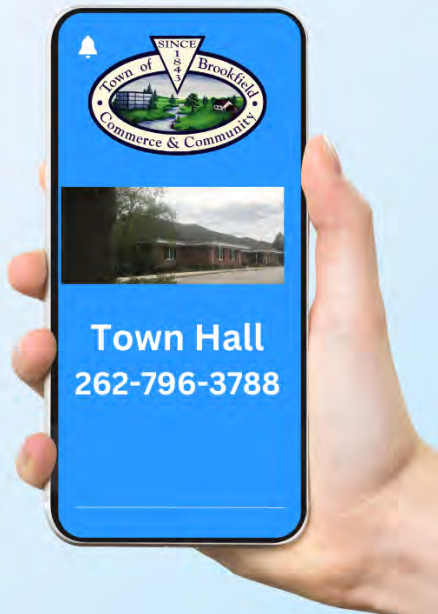

Take It From the Top!

Happy Holiday's Town Residents and Businesses!

I know not everyone enjoys the change of the seasons, especially when the temperature gets colder! For me though, I enjoy all the seasons but fall may be my favorite. The changing of the fall colors in Wisconsin is stunning, football and hunting are in full swing, and the holidays are right around the corner. I love it all! While you mull that over, let me update you on what's happening in the Town.

The Town's commitment to maintaining and enhancing our vehicular and pedestrian transportation facilities continues with the Davidson Road reconstruction project. The Town is partnering with the City of Brookfield and City of Waukesha to enhance approximately 1.8 miles of the Davidson Road corridor between Stonehedge Drive on the east in the City of Brookfield, west to the termination of Davidson Road in the City of Waukesha. The Town of Brookfield applied for and was awarded a \$1.73 million WisDOT Local Road Improvements grant to cover 70-percent of the Town's portion of the project cost. The project, which is scheduled to be completed in 2026, will replace the aging pavement, address existing drainage issues, and enhance both pedestrian and vehicular safety. Major components to this project include new curb and gutter and a multi-use path west of Barker Road, a widened roadway with 4-foot paved shoulders east of Barker Road, and a realignment of Davidson Road and new beam guard going up the hill east of the Poplar Creek Bridge. The installation of the multi-use path accomplishes a goal that has been included in Town planning documents stretching back to the 1990's and is referenced in the Town 2022-2042 Comprehensive Plan, the 2025 Town Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan, and the Waukesha County Bicycle Plan. A Public Informational Meeting (PIM) for this project is anticipated to be in mid-November for those who are interested in learning more about the project and/or to provide feedback on the proposed improvements.

The Town is once again projected to be in a good financial position as we approach the end of our fiscal year, coming in under budget and without spending any of the budgeted use of our savings. The Town Board recently approved posting the proposed 2025 levy (payable in 2026) in the amount of \$4,678,223, a 4.32% (\$193,814) increase over the 2024 levy. With an average 2025 assessment for a single family home in the Town of Brookfield of \$431,985, the average residential tax payer will see a tax increase of \$164 compared to 2024. The 2026 Budget Public Hearing for the Town of Brookfield is scheduled for Tuesday, November 18 at 7 p.m. and will be held at the Town Hall, 645 N. Janacek Road, Brookfield, WI 53045. This is a meeting of the Electors (residents) which means any Town resident may make motions and is open to the public. Those interested in learning more about the Town budget and participating in the process are encouraged to attend.

On a similar note, the Town's Tax Incremental District No. 1 (TID1) continues to perform well and outpace the projections included in the original Project Plan. The majority of the activity in the TID this year was again the Wimmer Communities Poplar Creek Town Center project at the northeast corner of Bluemound Road and Barker Road. The developer has completed Phase I and Phase II. Phase III is already under construction and is anticipated to be completed by the end of 2026. The Department of Revenue (DOR) reports that the 2025 value of TID1 is \$363,307,400 with an increment value of \$300,337,300 (compared to the value of base year 2014). This is a slight decrease of \$3,889,100 (-1%) over 2024. This is a result of the temporary decrease in value within the TID related to the buildings that were removed (razed) as part of the Poplar Creek Town Center project. It is anticipated that the value will rebound quickly and surpass the 2024 value with the completion of this development.

Election News

Become a Poll Worker

If you are interested in becoming a poll worker we encourage you to inquire within the Clerk's office for next steps. In order work the polls on Election Day you must attend at least one training session. These sessions are currently being scheduled. We have two shifts on Election Day, but you are more than welcome to work all day.

Our poll workers are essential to administering our elections. Not only do our poll workers work on Election Day, but many also assist in other needed areas. Poll workers are special voting deputies who aid our senior living facilities by allowing them the opportunity to vote within their facility. Poll workers also help conduct our In-Person Absentee voting otherwise known as "early voting".



Because staffing needs vary with each election, we want to ensure enough coverage to keep the process running smoothly.

We are also seeking experienced individuals interested in serving as Chief Inspectors. These positions require prior knowledge and experience, as Chief Inspectors are responsible for overseeing the election at their assigned polling location.

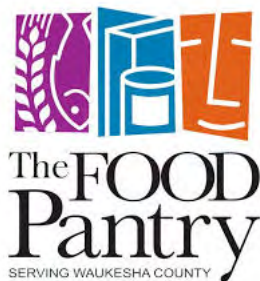

CONSTRUCTION UPDATE: OSCAR'S

Oscar's Frozen Custard, a cherished family-owned staple in the Town of Brookfield, is rising from the ashes of a devastating fire that gutted its original location at 21165 E. Moreland Blvd. on November 19, 2024. Owners Jim and Susie Taylor, undeterred by the setback, held a ceremonial groundbreaking on September 18, 2025, complete with ice cream scoops and toy shovels to honor the shop's legacy.

The ambitious rebuild has enhancements such as a dual-lane drive-thru, expanded 4,800-square-foot footprint, outdoor seating, and four vintage Leon's custard machines to meet surging demand for their flame-broiled burgers and creamy treats.

Construction is well underway, with the new spot slated to reopen in early 2026, likely January or February, bringing back generations of sweet memories to the Town of Brookfield.

CRIME PREVENTION

During this busy holiday season, it is easy to forget that criminals don't take the holidays off. They are out there trying any way possible to separate you from your valuables. Here are some tips to help keep you from becoming a victim of a crime and to have a more enjoyable holiday season:



- Don't carry large amounts of cash with you
- Place packages and other valuables in your trunk
- Park in well-lit locations and always lock your vehicle
- Don't shop alone if it can be avoided
- Don't give money to organizations you are not familiar with
- Remember; Give cards are gifts, not forms of payment
- Don't give personal information, i.e. social security number, to persons you don't know
- Be alert to the persons and things around you and if you see something or someone unusual, call the police

Snow Season & Over Night Parking Restrictions

7.06(3) (D) Snow Season Parking Restrictions: No person shall park, stop or leave standing any vehicle upon any street or highway in the Town from **NOVEMBER 1** through **APRIL 30**.

(E) Overnight Parking Restrictions: No person shall park or leave standing any vehicle upon any street or highway in the town from 2:00 am to 6:00 am all year.



Please call the Police Department for parking permission if you need to have vehicles on the roadway. Mon-Fri 8:00 am to 4:00 pm (262) 796-3798 or the Waukesha County Communications 24hr-Dispatch Center (262) 446-5070.

If You Are Involved in a Motor Vehicle Crash

- Don't leave the area
- Call Police immediately following the crash
- Wait safely in your vehicle until an Officer arrives
- If able to safely do so, move vehicles out of traffic onto closest side road or parking lot
- Exchange insurance information with involved parties

Per Wisconsin Statute s. 346.70(1), any crash within the State of Wisconsin must be reported when it results in:

- Injury of a person
- \$1,000 or more damage to any person's vehicle or property
- Damage of \$200 or more to state or other government-owned property other than a vehicle

If you do not meet the requirements of Wisconsin Statute s.

346.70(1) you can report your crash on the Wisconsin

Department of Transportation Website. Information you will need before starting your crash report:

- Your driver license number
- Vehicle Identification Number (VIN)
- Your Social Security Number



If you are going on vacation or if you are leaving the area for any reason, contact the police department and request a house check.

Please advise all pertinent information (Name, Address, Emergency Contact person, timers, lights, alarms, leaving any animals behind.)

This is a free service to Town residents provided by your police department.

UNUSED MEDICINE AND PRESCRIPTION DROP-OFF

Town of Brookfield's Drug Collection Unit site is open to the public from the hours of 8:00am-4:00pm Monday-Friday at the Police Department and drugs can be dropped off with no questions asked.

Items that are **ACCEPTED** include: Prescription (controlled and non-controlled) and over-the-counter medications, vitamins, medication samples, pet medications, ointments, patches, non-aerosol sprays, creams, vials, and liquid medication in a leak proof container.

While unpackaged pills and medications should not be placed in the drop box, it is helpful to combine loose pills into a single secure bag or container that can be deposited into the drop box and to discard excessive packaging before depositing pills and medication into the drop box.

Items that are **NOT ACCEPTED** include: Illegal drugs, needles/sharps/syringes, inhalers, aerosol cans, thermometers, biohazards material (anything containing a bodily fluid or blood), hydrogen peroxide, household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas), and personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens, ointments, etc.).



THE FIRE LINE



Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together. But that also means a greater risk of fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

Holiday Decorating

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors

Holiday Entertaining

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.



Decorate Smart - Stay Alive

More than **one-third** of home decoration fires are started by candles.

More than **two of every five** decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.



Put a **FREEZE** on Winter Carbon Monoxide Dangers

Carbon monoxide (CO) is a gas you cannot see, taste, or smell. It is often called **"the invisible killer."**

As you stay cozy and warm this winter, stay fire smart!



Install and maintain CO alarms inside your home to provide early warning of CO.



Make sure **vents** for the dryer, furnace, stove and fireplace **are clear** of snow and other debris.

Fire Safety during Winter Storms

Winter storms can happen almost anywhere. They can cause us problems. Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month. This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency. Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed.

Water and Cyber Security

With growing attention on cybersecurity in the utility sector, we want our community to know that protecting our water system is a top priority. Our SCADA (Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition) system, which monitors and controls water and sewer operations, is securely separated from all other office networks to prevent unauthorized access. We've recently upgraded our PLCs (Programmable Logic Controllers) – the devices that manage wells, pumps, and system monitoring – they communicate using encrypted signals, safeguarding against data leaks and cyber threats. Our system features over 180 alarm points that immediately notify our team of any issues, ensuring rapid response. Additionally, chemical dosing can only be adjusted manually on-site. This critical safeguard means that even if someone were to gain unauthorized digital access, they would be unable to alter chemical levels remotely. We work with agencies like the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA), the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), American Water Works Association (AWWA), and Wisconsin Rural Water Association (WRWA) to keep up to date with the changing environment of cyber security. We remain committed to maintaining a secure and resilient water infrastructure for the safety and well-being of our community.
